

Have you ever wondered why the enemy comes after women so hard? It's not just random—it's on purpose. From the very beginning, God gave women something powerful: *the seed of hope*. Think about Eve, the mother of all humanity, and Mary, the mother of Jesus. Both of these women played major roles in God's plan to save the world. That's huge! And the enemy knows it. He knows how vital we are to God's mission, so he works overtime trying to mess with us—twisting our roles, attacking our identity, and stirring up chaos in our families. He wants us to feel distracted, defeated, and far from God's purpose.

But here's the truth: God's design for us is solid. He made us with greatness inside. When we lean on Him, the enemy's attacks don't stand a chance. So today, let's talk about how we can live out that purpose, stand strong, and recognize the greatness God planted in us.

The enemy targets women for a reason. We are powerful—often more than we realize. We carry influence in our homes, our communities, and our faith. And it all ties back to *Her Seed of Hope*. From the beginning, Satan has hated women—not just as individuals but because of the dynamic role we play in God's bigger story. He's been trying to take us out since Eve, and he's still at it today.

Today's culture pushes a lot of independence talk—saying women don't need anyone, especially not men. And while there was a time when women had to fight for basic rights, things have swung too far in the other direction. Now, the confusion is so deep that even gender roles are being distorted. When men try to take on women's roles, and women are pushed to act like they don't need anyone, it's a direct hit against God's design.

God created men and women differently, each with divine purpose. When either role is distorted—especially the woman's—families begin to unravel. And when families are weakened, so is the entire culture.

But through Christ's strength and salvation, women can stand firm. We have something the enemy never will: a choice. After Jesus' resurrection, salvation is available to us, but not to him. The enemy can't undo his rebellion—he's permanently defeated. But we? We can rise, be redeemed, and walk fully in the purpose God placed in us.

From the Garden of Eden to today, women have been entrusted with the seeds of life. We multiply whatever is given to us—physically, spiritually, emotionally. That's why the attacks are so fierce. But when we stay rooted in faith, anchored in the truth of who God says we are, we can disrupt the

enemy's plans and fulfill the dynamic, powerful destiny God has planted within us.

Embrace your purpose. Protect your family. Stand in faith. You were born for greatness—and nothing the enemy throws at you can change the seed of hope God planted in your life.

OVERCOMING SATAN'S ATTACKS:

You can resist the enemy's tactics by standing firm in truth and living with intentional faith:

- Knowing your identity in Christ: A strong understanding of your value as a beloved daughter of God helps you resist lies about your worth.
- Strengthening your relationship with God: Through prayer, Scripture, and fellowship, you can guard against spiritual attacks.
- Embracing your God-given roles: Whether in leadership, family, or ministry, you can step confidently into your calling, knowing you are part of God's plan.

Today, we reflect on the theme: "*Her Seed of Hope*." This theme is deeply rooted in faith and woven through the lives of Eve, the mother of all, and Mary, the mother of our Savior. Their lives are foundational to God's redemptive story and symbolic of the hope we all carry.



The First Promise - Eve

Her Seed of Hope: A Promise Planted

Even in failure, God planted a redemptive seed in Eve. Her story reminds us that purpose begins right where we feel disqualified—and that every woman carries potential for legacy and restoration.

WEEK 1: THE FIRST PROMISE - EVE AND THE SEED OF REDEMPTION

FOCUS SCRIPTURES:

Genesis 3:1–24; Genesis 4:1–2, 25–26; Romans 5:12–1

1. THE ENEMY TARGETED THE LIFE-BEARER – BY TWISTING GOD'S WORD:

Genesis 3:1–7 The Temptation and Fall of Man

3 Now the serpent was more cunning than any beast of the field which the LORD God had made. And he said to the woman, “Has God indeed said, ‘You shall not eat of every tree of the garden’?”

2 And the woman said to the serpent, “We may eat the fruit of the trees of the garden; ³but of the fruit of the tree which is in the midst of the garden, God has said, ‘You shall not eat it, nor shall you touch it, lest you die.’”

4 Then the serpent said to the woman, “You will not surely die. ⁵For God knows that in the day you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.”

⁶So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, that it was ^[a]pleasant to the eyes, and a tree desirable to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate. She also gave to her husband with her, and he ate. ⁷Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves ^[b]coverings.

Eve was not just Adam's companion—she was the vessel through whom future generations would come. Satan targeted her because within her lay the potential for multiplication, growth, and, ultimately, redemption. Her influence over the family and the legacy of Mankind made her a primary target in the spiritual war.

Let's break it down. Satan didn't show up with fangs and fire—he came with a question. He asked, *"Did God really say...?"* That's how he works: not always loud, but always subtle. He gets you to *doubt* God before you *disobey* Him.

Eve didn't fall in one big moment. It started with a small opening—she listened, engaged, and let that seed of doubt grow. Once Satan had her attention, he twisted God's Word. He didn't just question it—he flat-out contradicted it: **"You will not surely die."*

And here's the thing: temptation always carries a sliver of truth. He told her her eyes would be opened—and they were, but not in the way she hoped. Instead of god-like power, she was shamed and separated.

This is why we're told not to give the enemy a foothold (Ephesians 4:27). Once he's got space, he sets up camp. And this is why Jesus said, *"Satan has nothing in Me"* (John 14:30). No access. No agreement. No open doors.


Here's what he still whispers today:

- "Sin's not a big deal."
- "God's holding out on you." We'll stop trusting His voice if he can get us to doubt God's heart.

Discussion Questions:

What subtle ways has the enemy tried to twist God's truth in your life?

Where have you seen doubt creep in and open the door to something destructive?



2. MORE THAN A CURSE

Genesis 3:14–15¹⁴ So the LORD God said to the serpent: “Because you have done this, You are cursed more than all cattle, And more than every beast of the field; On your belly you shall go, And you shall eat dust All the days of your life. ¹⁵ And I will put enmity Between you and the woman, And between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, And you shall bruise His heel.”

Okay, so Genesis 3:15? That's the *mic drop* moment right after sin enters the world. Everything just fell apart—Adam and Eve messed up big time. But right in the middle of God handing out the consequences, He slides in a promise. Not a "maybe," not a "let's see how things go," but a straight-up *guarantee* of hope. The protoevangelium is a fancy word, but it just means "first gospel."

God's basically like, "Yeah, this mess happened, but I've got a plan. And the plan? It's gonna crush the enemy."

"He will bruise your head, and you will bruise His heel."

That's Jesus. The enemy might've landed a shot — that heel bruise — but Jesus crushed his head. That wasn't Plan B. That was the plan from day one.

And get this — Eve carried the DNA of Jesus *from the beginning*. Every woman is born with all the eggs she'll ever need for life. So when Eve was created, the potential for every future generation was already in her, including the line that would lead to Christ.

It's wild when you think about it — when I was pregnant with my daughter, I was also carrying my grandkids, because she was already carrying her eggs. That's how legacy works. That's how God works. He starts something

in one generation that carries through the next — and in Eve's case, it carried all the way to the cross.

Jesus didn't dodge the pain. He stepped into it and still came out victorious.

The "seed of the woman" points straight to the virgin birth — no man involved. Just God and a willing woman.

This is the first gospel, and God preached it Himself. To the serpent. With Eve right there.

God's not after just restoring innocence — He's after full-blown redemption. Not a reset but a comeback.

Discussion Questions:

How does knowing God had a plan before the fall shift how you see your own failures?

What "heel bruises" have you walked through that God's turning into victory?

Let's unpack that.


1. This was never plan B.

God didn't get blindsided by Adam and Eve's sin. He already had the rescue mission ready. Even back in the garden, He saw what would happen at the cross. He wasn't trying to get us back to innocence. He wanted something *better*: redemption.

2. Seed of the woman = Jesus born of a virgin.

Here's the wild part—this "seed of the woman" language? That's a hint at the virgin birth. Jesus didn't come from Joseph. He came from Mary, born of the Spirit. No man involved. That was God's design from day one.

So yeah, Genesis 3:15? Not just a verse. It's the moment hope broke through the curse. God wasn't done with Eve. And He's not done with us, either.



3. EVE'S NEW NAME – A DECLARATION OF HOPE

Genesis 3:20 ²⁰And Adam called his wife's name Eve,^{1a} because she was the mother of all living.

Okay, so check this out: right after the fall, everything's a mess. Shame, blame, judgment—it's heavy. But then Adam does something surprising. He names his wife *Eve*, which means "mother of all living." Like... hold up. She hasn't even had a kid yet. But Adam speaks *life* over her anyway. He's not naming her based on her past—he's naming her based on what's coming. That's faith.

Eve's name wasn't about what she'd done. It was about what God was *going* to do through her. Adam heard God's promise (Genesis 3:15) and believed it. He trusted that *through her*, life would come. A deliverer would come. Jesus would come.

1. She didn't have a name until now.

We always say "Adam and Eve" like that's how it was from day one. But nah—this is the first time she's actually called *Eve*. Before this, she was just called "woman," "wife," or "helper." It's like Adam waited to give her that name until he had something *hopeful* to say over her as her covering. That's powerful.

2. God had already called them Mankind.

In Genesis 5:2, it says God named them both "Mankind." So when Adam calls her *Eve*, it's like he's giving her a personal word—a fresh identity. Not one rooted in failure, but one rooted in purpose.

3. Naming in faith.

Adam calls her the "mother of all living" before she even shows signs of pregnancy. That's not just a sweet nickname—that's a declaration. He's standing on God's promise: that the seed of the woman would one day

crush the serpent's head. Adam's saying, "Okay God, I believe You. She's not just my wife—she's the beginning of the comeback."

4. A reminder for us today.


Remember Eve if you feel like you've blown it or your story's too messed up to be used. God didn't throw her away. He built redemption *through* her. Her new name was a statement: *you're not done*. And that's true for you, too. You're not your past. You're who God says you are. There's hope over your name, too.

So next time you hear "Eve," don't just think "first woman." Think *first hope after the fall*. Her name tells us: God's not finished. Not with her. Not with you. Not with anybody who's willing to believe Him for what's next.

Discussion Questions:

Where in your life have guilt, shame, or self-doubt tried to silence the purpose God planted in you—and how can you begin to see those areas through God's truth instead?

What are some promises or dreams you believe God has placed inside you? How can you actively protect and nurture those seeds of hope in this season?



4. GOD'S REDEMPTION IS IMMEDIATE:

Genesis 3:21

²¹Also for Adam and his wife the LORD God made tunics of skin, and clothed them.

Romans 5:12–17 Death in Adam, Life in Christ

¹²Therefore, just as through one man sin entered the world, and death through sin, and thus death spread to all men, because all sinned— ¹³(For until the law sin was in the world, but sin is not imputed when there is no law. ¹⁴Nevertheless death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those who had not sinned according to the likeness of the transgression of Adam, who is a type of Him who was to come. ¹⁵But the free gift is not like the ¹⁴offense. For if by the one man's offense many died, much more the grace of God and the gift by the grace of the one Man, Jesus Christ, abounded to many. ¹⁶And the gift is not like that which came through the one who sinned. For the judgment which came from one offense resulted in condemnation, but the free gift which came from many ¹⁵offenses resulted in justification. ¹⁷For if by the one man's ¹⁴offense death reigned through the one, much more those who receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness will reign in life through the One, Jesus Christ.)

Right after the fall, God doesn't toss Eve aside. He doesn't disqualify her — He includes her. He covers her, speaks to her, and uses her to kick off the plan that would eventually bring Jesus. Her womb becomes the starting point for redemption. That's God — turning shame into purpose. That's mercy stepping into the mess with mission.

Romans 5:12 — Sin Showed Up, and So Did Death

Here's the truth: sin came into the world through one man — Adam. And when sin showed up, death was right behind it. That's why death hits everyone — not just because we sin, but because we were all wrapped up in Adam when he dropped the ball.

And let's be real — Eve wasn't hit with the blame here. She was deceived, but Adam straight-up knew better and still went there. Because of that, sin spread like wildfire. You don't have to teach kids how to lie or be selfish — it's already baked in, thanks to Adam.


But here's the upside: if one man's failure messed us all up, one man's righteousness — Jesus — can make us right again.

Under Adam, death ruled. Under Jesus, we get to *live* — like real, eternal, purposeful life. His life is stronger than death, more solid than anything else. Rock solid. Forever.

Discussion Questions:

How does seeing God immediately redeem Eve after the fall change the way you view your own mistakes or failures?

What are some areas in your life right now where God might be inviting you to trade shame for purpose — to let His mercy meet your mess with mission?




REFLECTION:

In the very beginning, God gave women something powerful — *the seed of hope*. We were designed with influence, strength, and the ability to carry life — both physically and spiritually. But because of this powerful role, the enemy has targeted women fiercely from the start. He knows the impact we have when we walk in our true identity, so he works overtime to distract, defeat, and discourage us.

Yet even when mistakes happen, God's mercy steps in immediately. Eve wasn't disqualified after the fall — she was covered, called, and commissioned. God used her womb to start the redemption story that would eventually bring Christ. His plan for women has *always* been about restoration, hope, and purpose.

Today, no matter what the past holds, we are called to stand up, carry the promises God has placed within us, and protect the seeds of destiny He planted. His redemption is not delayed—it's immediate. Our mistakes don't stop His mission. We are part of His plan to bring life, healing, and hope to the world around us.




Group Discussion Questions:

Where in your own story have you seen God's mercy step in immediately after a mistake or failure? How did it change your perspective about His character?

What does it mean to you personally that God chose women to carry the seed of hope, even after the fall? How does that truth impact the way you see your purpose today?

Is there an area in your life where you feel like the enemy has tried to attack your identity or purpose? How can you begin to protect the seed of hope God has planted in you?

Reflecting on Eve's story, how can we encourage one another as women to rise up, live redeemed, and walk in the strength and boldness God intended for us?



PRAYER:

Father,

Today, I come before You, thanking You for Your goodness and mercy that never run out. I lay down every burden of guilt, shame, or self-doubt rooted in my past mistakes. I ask You to heal every hidden wound, every silent fear, and every place where I have believed less about myself than what You have spoken. Restore my purpose, my identity, and my spiritual boldness. Remind me that I am who *You* say I am — a daughter, a warrior, a nurturer, and a life-carrier — created on purpose, for purpose.

Strengthen me to carry and protect the promises and purposes You have planted inside of me. Let no attack of the enemy, no voice of fear, and no storm of life uproot what You have started in me. Teach me to guard the seeds You've placed within me with fierce faith and steady hope. Help me to walk boldly in the truth that I was made for more.

And today, I simply want to say thank You — thank You for trusting women, including me, with the very first promise of redemption. Thank You for continuing to use women as vessels of hope, healing, and life. I receive that calling with an open heart. I step into it with bold faith. I trust You to finish what You started in me. **In Jesus' name, Amen.**

CHALLENGE FOR THE WEEK:

Take 10–15 minutes this week to sit with God and ask Him: “What seeds of hope have You planted in me that the enemy has tried to bury?”

Write down anything that comes to your heart — dreams, gifts, promises, even little nudges you may have pushed aside. Then, pray over those seeds. Ask God to breathe fresh life and boldness into them.

Declare this over yourself: *“God’s mercy meets my mistakes. His mission still moves through me. I am a carrier of hope and purpose.”*

Bonus Step: Share one thing God shows you with a trusted friend or someone in the group. Let them agree with you in prayer that the seed will grow and bear fruit.



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WEEK 2: *THE FULFILLMENT – MARY AND THE SEED OF SALVATION*

Focus Scriptures:

Luke 1:26–38; Matthew 1:1–16; Galatians 4:4–7; Isaiah 7:14

Christ's Birth Announced to Mary **Luke 1:26–33 NKJV**

26 Now in the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, 27 to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. 28 And having come in, the angel said to her, "Rejoice, highly favored one, the Lord is with you; ²⁹blessed are you among women!"

²⁹But ^bwhen she saw him, she was troubled at his saying, and considered what manner of greeting this was. ³⁰Then the angel said to her, “Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bring forth a Son, and shall call His name JESUS. ³²He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David. ³³And He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of His kingdom there will be no end.”

1. MARY, THE CHOSEN VESSEL

Mary's Yes: Luke 1:34-38 NKJV

³⁴Then Mary said to the angel, “How can this be, since I ^ado not know a man?” ³⁵And the angel answered and said to her, “The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God. ³⁶Now indeed, Elizabeth your relative has also conceived a son in her old age; and this is now the sixth month for her who was called barren. ³⁷For with God nothing will be impossible.” ³⁸Then Mary said, “Behold the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to your word.” And the angel departed from her.

Let's just pause and think about this—God could've chosen anyone to carry His Son. A queen. A prophet's daughter. Someone with a big reputation and lots of spiritual credentials. But He didn't. He chose Mary—a teenage girl from a small town without status, fame, or experience. Why? Because her heart was available.

Mary had no résumé that screamed "Messiah-bearer," but she had faith and a yes in her spirit. That's what God was looking for. He still is.


Sometimes we disqualify ourselves because of our lack of money, time, influence, and spiritual knowledge. But God isn't scanning LinkedIn profiles. He's looking for people who are willing. Mary's story reminds us that God does extraordinary things through ordinary people who are open to Him.

Discussion Questions:

What does Mary's story teach you about how God chooses His people?

Have you ever felt "unqualified" for something God called you to do? How did you respond?

What's one area of your life where God might be saying, "I just need your yes"?



2. A FULFILLMENT OF PROMISE

Prophecy: Isaiah 7:14 NKJV

¹⁴Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel.¹⁵

The Virgin Birth: Luke 1:35 NKJV

³⁵And the angel answered and said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Highest will overshadow you; therefore, also, that Holy One who is to be born will be called the Son of God.

Mary's "yes" in *Luke 1:38*—*"Let it be to me according to your word"—*wasn't just a sweet moment. It was prophetic. It echoed all the way back to *Genesis*

3:15, where God promised that the seed of the woman would crush the serpent's head. Mary's yes made that ancient promise come alive.

Through her obedience, heaven and earth aligned. The curse was being reversed. Jesus, born of a woman, came to destroy the works of the enemy. Her role wasn't small. It was essential. And it all hinged on trust and surrender.


This is what obedience can do—it connects God's promises across generations. Your yes can carry more weight than you realize.

3. WOMEN IN THE LINEAGE OF JESUS

The Genealogy of Jesus Christ: Matthew 1:1-6; 16

1 The book of the genealogy^[a] of Jesus Christ, the Son of David, the Son of Abraham:

2 Abraham begot Isaac, Isaac begot Jacob, and Jacob begot Judah and his brothers. 3 Judah begot Perez and Zerah by Tamar, Perez begot Hezron, and Hezron begot Ram. 4 Ram begot Amminadab, Amminadab begot Nahshon, and Nahshon begot Salmon. 5 Salmon begot Boaz by Rahab, Boaz begot Obed by Ruth, Obed begot Jesse, 6 and Jesse begot David the king.

16 And Jacob begot Joseph the husband of Mary, of whom was born Jesus who is called Christ. (Joseph is also a descendant of David)

When we look at *Matthew 1*, we see something surprising. The genealogy of Jesus includes five women: Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary. Each of their stories is complicated. Some were outsiders. Some were scandalized. Some made bold, risky moves. But all were part of God's plan.

Including them in the family line of Jesus wasn't random. It was intentional. It shows that God doesn't wait for perfect people—He works through real people with real pasts. That means there's room for all of us in His story.


If you've ever thought your past disqualifies you, look again. These women prove that God writes redemption into every chapter.

Discussion Questions:

Which woman in Jesus' genealogy do you most relate to, and why?

How does their inclusion encourage you in your own faith journey?

What do their stories show us about God's grace and purpose?



4. MARY'S FAITH IN THE MIDST OF MYSTERY

Galatians 4:4–7

⁴But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His Son, born^[a] of a woman, born under the law, ⁵to redeem those who were under the law, that we might receive the adoption as sons. ⁶And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, ^[b]“Abba, Father!” ⁷Therefore you are no longer a slave but a son, and if a son, then an heir ^[c]of God ^[d]through Christ.

Mary asked the angel one honest question: *"How can this be?"* She wasn't doubting—she was trying to wrap her mind around a miracle. And the angel didn't rebuke her. He simply explained how God would work.

Mary didn't get a blueprint. She didn't get the full picture. But she still said yes. That's what real faith looks like. Not the absence of questions—but the presence of surrender.


There are times God calls us into things that don't make sense. Maybe it's a step of obedience that feels risky, or a season that feels foggy. In those moments, we can learn from Mary. We don't need all the answers. We just need to trust the One who does.

Discussion Questions:

How do you usually respond when you don't understand what God is doing?

What might it look like to say "yes" even without full understanding?



5. LIVING IN THE FULFILLMENT

Living in the Fulfillment: Galatians 4:4–7

“But when the set time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption to sonship...”

Key Truths:


- **You're not just saved—you're adopted.**
Because of Jesus, you're not on the outside looking in. You've been brought into God's family as His daughter.
► *Romans 8:17* says, “*If we are children, then we are heirs—heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ.*”
- **You carry Jesus now—just like Mary.**
Mary carried Him physically. Now, we carry His Spirit, His truth, and His purpose wherever we go.
► *2 Corinthians 4:7*: “*But we have this treasure in jars of clay...*”
- **The promise didn't stop with Mary—it continues through you.**
God's plan didn't end at the manger or the cross. You're part of it.
► *Ephesians 2:10*: “*We are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works...*”
- **You are on a mission.**
Mary didn't stop being faithful after Jesus was born—she lived it. So do we. Our faith becomes light in a dark world.
► *Matthew 5:14–16*: “*You are the light of the world... Let your light shine before others...*”

Discussion Questions:

How are you carrying Christ's hope into your world right now?


Where might God be calling you to leave survival mode and step into legacy?

The Cost and Courage of Obedience

Saying yes to God isn't always easy — and it definitely wasn't easy for Mary. Her yes came with real risks: rejection, misunderstanding, possible shame from her community, and an unknown future. She said yes anyway. Obedience often asks us to trust God with the parts of the story we can't see yet. It calls us to surrender our comfort, our control, and sometimes even our reputation. But like Mary, when we choose courage over comfort, our obedience opens the door for God's greater plan to unfold — not just in our lives, but through our lives for others. God is still looking for hearts that will say, *"Let it be to me according to Your word."* Even when it costs us. Even when it stretches us. Because He's faithful to take every surrendered yes and turn it into something eternal.



Eve to Mary – The Full Circle of Hope

From the very beginning, God spoke a promise into Eve's story: that the seed of a woman would one day crush the serpent's head (Genesis 3:15). Thousands of years later, Mary's yes made that ancient promise come alive. Eve carried the first seed of hope in faith. Mary carried the fulfillment of that hope in her womb.

Through Eve came the human race, stained by sin but marked for redemption. Through Mary came the Redeemer Himself, the one who would undo the curse of sin and death forever.

The same enemy that tried to destroy Eve's seed met his defeat when Mary gave birth to Christ.


Their lives are linked by one unbreakable thread:
Hope planted by God.
Hope protected through generations.
Hope fulfilled through surrender.

And today, that same hope lives inside of us — not because of who we are, but because of who He is.

We are carriers of His promises. Protectors of His purpose.

Just like Eve.

REFLECTION:

When God was ready to send His Son into the world, He didn't go looking for someone famous, rich, or perfectly put-together. He chose Mary—a young, ordinary girl with an available heart. She didn't have all the qualifications the world looks for, but she had faith and a willing spirit. Her story reminds us that God isn't impressed by our résumés or reputations—He's looking for our yes. Through Mary's obedience, an ancient promise all the way from Genesis came alive. Her simple surrender broke centuries of waiting and opened the door for redemption to step onto the earth. Her yes mattered. It still matters today because it shows us what can happen when we trust God without needing all the answers. Even when things didn't make sense, Mary said yes to carrying the promise, protecting it, and walking it out. She stands alongside other women in Jesus' lineage—women with messy pasts, outsider labels, and complicated stories. And yet, God wove them all into His perfect plan. Their lives remind us that no matter where we come from, His grace is big enough to cover us, use us, and move through us. We don't have to have it all figured out. We just need a heart that's willing to trust Him.

Group Discussion Questions:

What stands out to you about the kind of person God chose to carry His promise? How does that encourage you in your own walk with Him?

Mary didn't have all the answers, but she still said yes. Have you ever had to step out in faith without knowing the full picture? What helped you trust God in that moment?

Looking at the women in Jesus' family line (Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary), what do their stories teach us about God's grace, redemption, and purpose? How do the women in Jesus' genealogy encourage you about your own journey?


Is there an area of your life right now where God is asking you for a simple "yes"? How can you lean into that even if it feels uncertain?



PRAYER:

Today, I come before You with a heart wide open. Thank You for choosing people like Mary — not because of status, reputation, or perfection, but because of a willing heart. I'm reminded that You are not looking for someone who has it all together — You are looking for someone who will simply say yes. I lay down every fear, doubt, and feeling of being unqualified. I ask You to strengthen my faith like You did in Mary. Even when I don't have all the answers, even when the future feels unclear, help me trust You fully. Remind me that my yes can carry more weight than I realize. I want to be available for Your purposes, willing to carry and protect the promises You have planted inside of me.

Thank You for weaving redemption into every part of my story — just like You did for Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary. Thank You that my past doesn't disqualify me and that nothing is wasted in Your hands. I choose today to trust You deeper, to surrender where I've been holding back, and to walk forward even when the way isn't fully mapped out. I believe You are writing something beautiful through my life. I say yes to Your plans, yes to Your promises, and yes to the calling You have placed over me. I trust You to finish what You started. **In Jesus' name, Amen.**



Challenge – Week 2: The Fulfillment


This week, take time to pray this simple prayer each morning: *"God, I don't need all the answers — I just need to trust You. I say yes to whatever You want to do through me."*

Write down one area where you feel God nudging you to say yes — even if it feels unclear, scary, or bigger than you. Pray over it daily. Speak life over it. Remind yourself that you don't have to be perfect or have it all figured out. You just need an available heart.

Remember:

God does extraordinary things through ordinary people who are willing. Your yes today could unlock a whole new chapter of promise tomorrow.
